Partners and Friends

In 2022, the Foundation continued to focus our philanthropic efforts on our four main funding areas: employment, removing barriers to employment, entrepreneurship and legacy organizations. We are proud to have made \$2,014,493 in grants and program-related investments across these four focus areas.

In addition to our grant making and program related investing, we set aside time to renew our Theory of Change, expand upon our strategic plan and develop a grant application scoring rubric. Our hope was to provide more guidance on ways to successfully engage within our areas of focus with four defined approaches:

- Promoting supportive services to help address and remove barriers to selfsufficiency
- Cultivating nonprofit and private sector alliances
- Training and skill building
- Building pathways to entrepreneurship

After completing a grantee perception in the Fall of 2022 survey, we learned that although our partners believe interactions with the Foundation have been strong during our grant application process and expectations of applicants for the Foundation are typically met, areas of improvement surfaced, including:

- Reducing the amount of time between submitting an application and receiving grant decision,
- Increasing collaboration with community and other funders.
- Better aligning application process with size of the grant.
- Reduce the amount of time required to complete an application

This feedback enabled us to simplify our grant application process, which will be available for our Fall 2023 grant cycle and extend our grant cycle from 12 months to 18 months, enabling us to better integrate grant evaluation into future funding consideration and improve our work.

We have engaged an impact manager to help address these areas and other places for improvement as we work to provide world class philanthropy across our state.



2022 Funding


